ABOUT OUR LEADERSHIP

Community Church has five main groups of leaders that work in their various roles to lead our church and to facilitate our mission: to exalt God; to equip His church; to extend His grace in Gloucester, the surrounding communities, and around the world; and to enjoy His presence.

OUR ELDERS

Community Church is governed by a board of elders. Informally, the role of the elders is to create the best possible environment for everyone at Community Church to use their gifts to build up the body and bring glory to Jesus Christ. They are a group of people that come from diverse church backgrounds and life experiences, but who find unity in their commitment to Christ and their commitment to serve and lead Community Church. Our elders are brought before the congregation on an annual basis for reaffirmation at the Annual Meeting. Even as the lead pastor carries specific leadership responsibilities, he is understood to be a fulltime elder. The elders meet every other month, and on an as-needed basis, to address matters of doctrine, direction, church discipline and staff development. Additionally, every elder is a member of the Leadership Team (see below), working together with that team to pray for our church, and to lead the church on a day-to-day basis. This year, our elders were: Dean Sidell, Chris Love, Cory Ward, Steve Zacchigna, and Pastor Tim Bushfield.

OUR LEADERSHIP TEAM

The Leadership Team is the main leadership body that oversees and supports the day-to-day life and ministry of the church. This team includes men and women who have been identified as having leadership and shepherding gifts to serve the church as a whole, in addition to any specific ministries in which they might be involved. The

Leadership Team meets monthly to evaluate and discuss vision implementation, ministry direction, and upcoming events. They also discuss things like potential teaching directions and shepherding needs in the church community. The team spends time praying together over our church and for individuals in our body when we meet. In addition to the monthly meetings, people from the Leadership Team are also involved in shepherding in smaller groups and in one-on-one situations where compassion, discipleship, or shepherding is needed for a season.

This year, our leadership team included: David Broberg, Jacqueline Broberg, Emily Caren, Katie Madden, Amanda Matczynski, and Matt Nilan.

OUR DISCIPLESHIP LEADERS

Throughout the history of the church, discipleship has been the primary mechanism for growing followers of Jesus. Rather than being a one-size-fits-all ministry, discipleship exists as a beautiful variety. Some choose to meet in pairs. Others may form triads of three. Still others meet in larger "small" groups of up to ten. Regardless of the form, the goal is to move ever closer to Jesus as we grow in relationship, study God's word, pray, and serve together.

This year, David Broberg continued to serve as our interim Discipleship Coordinator as our church began a formal hiring search process to find a new Associate Pastor of Discipleship, following Pastor Jake Brook's call to full time military chaplaincy. Throughout the year, David continued to meet with small group leaders and other disciple-makers in our church to equip and encourage them as they've continued the work of making disciples who are following Jesus and growing in relationship with Him.



OUR MINISTRY TEAMS

At Community Church, with our distinctive of collaboration, we do as much of our ministry as possible in teams. Our ministry teams are made up of volunteers who pour their hearts into making our church community a dynamic, growing place of worship and growth. From our children's ministry leaders to our worship teams, and from our Men's Ministry to our VBS crew, these men and women serve faithfully and tirelessly to build up the body of Christ. This is a dynamic group of people, and there are often changes in these teams from season to season as people step in and out of ministry roles. But they serve as a key element within our leadership structure at Community Church, and we are so grateful for all their hard work and dedication to their ministries and to each other.

OUR ADMIN TEAM

We have a team of people who work behind the scenes to support the various ministries of the church from a facilities and financial standpoint. The Executive Admin Team consists of the Chair of the Admin Team (Dean Sidell); the Lead Pastor (Tim Bushfield); along with the Treasurer (Amanda Matczynski); the Collector (Emily Bell); the Bookkeeper (Bill Woodson); Human Resources (Marianne Peterson); the chair of FIT, our Facilities Improvement Team (Russ Webber); and our Ministry Coordinator (Katie Madden). They work to implement the congregationally-approved budget throughout the year, and together they provide the much-needed administrative support that keeps Community Church running and engaged in significant, life changing ministry.

OUR CHURCH STAFF

In partnership with these five main groups of leaders in the church, we have a staff team that works together to support and invest in all of the above leaders, as well as providing concrete and consistent leadership among those teams. This year, Tim Bushfield continued in the Lead Pastor role, with Matt Nilan serving as a full time Associate Pastor, including his ongoing work with our YouthCenter ministry and Worship Teams. Katie Madden continued in her role as Ministry Coordinator, serving for 30 hours per week, and we were blessed with additional staff filling the following interim roles: Emily Caren as interim Children's Ministry Coordinator, David Broberg as interim Discipleship Coordinator, and Michael Mitchell as interim Community Life Coordinator.

Together, these teams cover all the bases of church leadership and provide a concrete collaborative leadership environment that legitimately equips and empowers members of Community Church as we all strive to use our gifts to build up our local part of the body of Christ.



LEAD PASTOR ANNUAL REPORT 2023

There are times when I feel like my life is Nazareth. As in, "Nazareth! Can anything good come out of Nazareth?!" (John 1:46). If you haven't been a part of our church until more recently, you'll know we've had many hurdles to overcome as a church, and I personally continue to have hurdles to overcome. There are three such hurdles I'd like to mention here: the quest for our next Associate Pastor of Discipleship, our new partnership with Revival Church for the Nations, and the miraculous ways the Lord refuses to let me withdraw from my Ph.D. program. In these three stories, I've seen evidence of God's miraculous and exciting work that has all taken place in the midst of hardship, of being overwhelmed, and of feeling like I don't have the personal resources to get the job done. I have felt like a backwater town, like Nazareth, wondering if anything good can come of all this. Turns out, for followers of Jesus, it can.

The Quest for an Associate Pastor

As a church, we've been on a seemingly endless quest to find and keep an Associate Pastor of Discipleship, ever since 2015 when we sent Justin Frank to pastor a church up in Augusta, Maine. In those eight years, we've had at least that many people on staff with us, either full time or part time, in various roles from coordinators to chaplains to interims to associate pastors that — for one reason or another — have not worked out. For most of these people, their time with us has been an opportunity for mutual growth as the candidates decided that pastoral ministry was not a good fit for them, and as we've refined the kind of person we sense the Lord is calling us to seek. They have been long hard years. Nazareth. Sheesh.

But, I want to say a special "thank you" to those who have been involved in this revolving door of a hiring process; to those who have volunteered their time and energy and discernment and prayer through their participation on one of the Hiring Teams (or all of the Hiring Teams). You have all been such a behind-the-scenes blessing, serving in an unseen and rarely appreciated role. I'm so grateful for your partnership, the partnership of the elders and the Leadership Team, and honestly, the faithfulness of the church at large through these years. We've seen God not only help the church survive these years, but even thrive through these years, bringing new people and families to our community, and empowering Christ-centered living and real spiritual growth as we've loved one another and loved our city.

I'm also super excited that the Lord has led us to the final stages with Dana Olson as potentially our next Associate Pastor of Discipleship. It has been a longer hiring process this time around, with much harder decisions along the way as we have sought to follow the Lord's leading over what we might have seen as the more convenient, obvious, or easier choices we could have made as a Hiring Team. I've known Dana for many years, and I am so grateful that someone of her wisdom and maturity, giftedness, and love for the Lord might be joining our staff team this year. I invite you to continue



praying over this process, and specifically for Dana and her family as this process moves forward in the coming weeks. Look at that: something good coming out of Nazareth after all!

A New Partnership with RCN

One of the most significant partnerships we've ever taken on in my 20+ years of service here at Community Church happened this year as we formally welcomed Revival Church for the Nations to share our facility and our gospel mission here in the city of Gloucester. RCN is a Brazilian-Portuguese-speaking church that has been here in Gloucester for over 20 years, and at the end of 2022 they lost their worship space. Through a connection with our summer VBS program, our church prayerfully considered what it would mean to partner with RCN and to share our facility with them on a permanent basis. From the elders and Leadership Team, to our Sunday School teachers and YouthCenter leaders, our whole church rose to the invitation and excitedly affirmed what God seemed to be doing: making even better use of the resources He's entrusted to us, and partnering with a people group in our city with whom we've historically (and embarrassingly) had very little contact. In January of this year, we welcomed them to 7 Chapel Street as their new church home. "Bem vindo à sua nova casa!"

Working across a language barrier and working with those of different cultural values has been eyeopening, and it's been such a rewarding experience to open this partnership with them. To meet and pray with Pastor Antonio and Maria, asking for God's blessing on this partnership was one of the most special moments in my years of ministry — even though I had very little idea what they were praying! It's been so good to work with their sound tech team and their worship teams to integrate our sound systems. It was magical to intentionally include them in our Cape Ann Worship Nights — to the point of inviting their worship team to lead a worship set, and also ensuring we had Portuguese lyrics on screen for the worship songs led by other teams. Our Easter Sunrise service was so special as Michael Mitchell shared (and had each sentence translated into Portuguese) so that we could celebrate the resurrection of Jesus together on the back shore. Pastor Matt even was the speaker at their youth conference. We continue to look for ways to actively partner and share in the mission of the Gospel here in Gloucester. And as of the writing of this report, I currently have a 275 day streak on DuoLingo as I attempt to learn Brazilian Portuguese. I still have no idea how to speak it, and they talk way too fast for me to understand them, and I only know words like "apple" and "house" and "kitchen", but someday I want to be able to pray with our brothers and sisters from RCN and understand them as they pray! It's just another glimpse of how God has been on the move, even in times of transition, to bring glimpses of His kingdom all around us, if we're open to taking risks for His glory. It could have been a grumbling, "Can anything good come out of Nazareth," kind of experience. Instead, living "in Nazareth" has once again proven to be a blessing and an encouragement!

The Miraculous Salvage of a Degree

Lastly, I wanted to share some miracles with you. Yes, our God is a God of miracles, and He still does them in our day and in our time.

I have been in a Ph.D. program since 2015, studying collaboration and preaching (based on the



preaching team model we developed here at Community Church). But that same year, we said farewell to two different staff members, and kicked off eight more years of staffing turnover, global pandemics, military deployments, more staffing turnover, and then my diagnosis with Long Covid. Through these years, I have kept pushing my studies off — my priority calling has always been to our church before my studies, and these were once-in-a-generation issues that we were facing as a church; and if my capacity was limited by my health, my first responsibility was to our church family. So I tried to withdraw from my program multiple times, and was talked out of withdrawing multiple times by my advisor, Dr. Scott Gibson. But at the end of this past year, it became apparent to me that I would not be finishing the degree. My period of registration had expired; to continue would mean paying full tuition all over again to the tune of \$15,000 per year (after having already finished paying for the degree). And I had a secondary advisor across the pond at London School of Theology who wanted me to redirect my project into his own area of expertise (after eight years going in one direction, he wanted me to virtually start over to align with his own research field). So I filled out the paperwork, and was about to withdraw, when I got a phone call.

Miracle #1: I was known personally to the Director of Research at LST even though I'm a distance-learning student working in the United States through a partner institution (Gordon-Conwell Theological Seminary) and under an American advisor (Dr. Scott Gibson). I should have been no more than a student number in a database to anyone at LST; yet Dr. McFarlane called me personally while I was having the oil changed on my Mazda.

Miracle #2: He broke through my perfectionism. After he solicited the full story of why I was withdrawing from the program, he said that he could tell I was working at a high level and that I wanted to produce an excellent Ph.D. project. He countered with this: "How would you feel about submitting an adequate Ph.D. instead of an excellent one?" He was suggesting that I try to salvage the work I've already done to get a degree, rather than withdrawing because I couldn't do the kind of work I wanted to do. It was a distasteful proposal that I needed to be open to.

Miracle #3: He found me money. I told him that financially, the school's policy on restarting payments at full tuition rates was a deal-breaker, and that I could not afford to continue. Within 48 hours he called back to say that LST had issued a decision that they could not waive my tuition, but that he had secured a bursary from a little known fund at the school that would cover my expenses for one year if I just cleaned up my project and submitted it. My final year has been completely paid for.

Miracle #4: He changed my secondary supervisor. I outlined my concerns about my secondary advisor and his desire to redirect my project towards his own area of research (this same secondary advisor also happened to be the president of the seminary). Within a week, I received another phone call telling me that not only had my former secondary supervisor withdrawn from my project (based on a lack of alignment with his area of expertise) but that the Director of Research himself had agreed to be my secondary supervisor to personally help me salvage the work I've done and to help me get the degree.

Miracle #5: He volunteered to hand-select my defense panel. He also expressed such solidarity with my salvage efforts that he said he'd look to assemble a defense panel that would understand my goals as a doctoral student and that would be at least sympathetic to the idea of salvaging a degree from years of interruptions that were far beyond my own control. So when I have to defend my dissertation this coming summer, it will be before a panel of people who understand the special challenges I've faced and who will be able to give me direct and targeted feedback to bring my project to where a Ph.D. can be awarded.

I have called these things "miracles" because these things just don't happen in academia. Working towards a Ph.D. is definitely a "living in Nazareth; Can anything good come out of Nazareth" kind of experience. But in spite of the setbacks, the interruptions, the deployments, the pandemics, and my own Long Covid diagnosis, something good has come out of Nazareth. London School of Theology is taking a personal interest in seeing me finish my Ph.D. In response, the elders and the Leadership Team have agreed to give me the three months after Easter (April, May and June) to dedicate to finishing my dissertation, with the goal of submitting it on June 30, 2024 and defending it sometime before Christmas.

I'm starting to like Nazareth again. What at first seemed like years of hardship, of interruptions, of instability, of being overwhelmed, and health issues have turned into a story of our God's faithfulness towards us as a church, towards our city as we forge new gospel partnerships, and to me personally as He invites me to finish the work on my dissertation that He called me to all those years ago. Maybe you're feeling like you're living in Nazareth, and that nothing good can come from any of it. Hang on. You just never know what God can bring out of backwater places...

2024 ELDERS' REPORT

2023 at Community Church closed with a service centered around God's Glory and recognizing the ways in which God works in our lives to reveal and manifest His glory, as well as the ways in which we as believers can show His glory to others as we walk through this life in faith. We were also reminded that our plans and expectations mean very little when reflecting on what is possible with a great and glorious God.

2023 began with Community Church celebrating the Brooks family, as we sent Jake and Leah and the girls into full-time ministry as an Army Chaplain, and with Tim beginning to transition back into pastoral ministry while still dealing with the effects of long covid. In the midst of all of this change God was in control and continually faithful. David Broberg agreed to continue in his role of Discipleship Coordinator, Emily Caren continued her work and ministry with Sunday School and Nursery programs in her role as Children's Ministry Coordinator, and Michael Mitchel came on staff as the Interim Coordinator of Community Life. Tim Bushfield, as Senior Pastor, Matt Nilan, as Associate Pastor and Katie Madden, as Ministry Coordinator completed an incredible staff team of gifted, dedicated servants working to come alongside all of those in the congregation, to work to equip us to serve, to exalt Christ and to extend God's grace to each other and to an unbelieving world. God has blessed Community Church with an amazing staff, and we are so thankful for each one of them.

In the spring, the Elders formed a Hiring Team to begin the search for an experienced associate pastor to join the team at Community Church. The Hiring Team consisted of the Elders, members of the Lead Team, and two members of the congregation. The position was posted internally and externally. The team received several applications, held interviews and prayed through each applicant, seeking God's guidance for the person He has selected for this important role. As we closed the year, the Hiring Team was excited to submit Dana Olson to the Lead Team as its recommendation for the position. Dana comes with significant experience, a heart for serving God, and a calling to ministry at Community Church. We look forward to completing this search and filling out the staff team in 2024.

As we enter 2024, the Elders will also experience some change in our membership. This fall Steve Zacchigna and his family moved to CT to be closer to family. Steve and Rachel have been a dedicated part of Community Church for many years. We will miss them very much and know God will bless another congregation with their service. We are also pleased to announce an addition to the Elders at Community Church. David Broberg has been part of Community Church for many years, serving on the Lead Team, teaching Sunday Morning Seminars, preaching, and serving part time as the Coordinator of Discipleship. We look forward to David's insights and participation on the Elder Board.

One of the many impacts of the various transitions at Community Church and Tim's long covid is that his Doctoral work was both delayed, and in many cases, put on hold. In 2023 all of the various deadlines and resources had run their course, and it became clear that Tim would likely need to give up his doctoral work. But, God had other plans. In what was nothing short of a series of miracles (see details in Tim's report) God provided both a time extension and the financial resources for him



to finish his doctoral work in 2024. We are very supportive of making sure Tim has the appropriate time to complete this work in 2024, and we look forward to the many ways God will use his work in the future.

Annual Reports are often opportunities to cast a new vision, a new direction or exciting new initiatives. What is in store for Community Church in 2024 is somewhat of a glorious mystery, but we can be sure that God is in control, that we are here to serve him by equipping one another, by exalting Him, by extending His grace to each other and to an unbelieving world, and by enjoying his presence, both individually and collectively.

LEAD TEAM REPORT



The Lead Team spends much of its time and energy on the tyranny of the immediate. This isn't a bad thing. The present moment is full of needs for prayer, for places to serve, for new people to welcome and get to know. The demands of now could consume all of the attention of the team, but there is a need to look ahead, to plan, and to anticipate what's next. Annual reports don't just appear out of thin air (though Katie Madden continues to excel at organizing the disparate threads that make up each year's report, and Marc Nicastro jumped in to help design and produce this year's final publication). Annual Celebrations are not improvised events. Each season requires forethought and preparation. Still, the team spends precious little time looking back at where we've come. Fortunately, the team takes good notes (Thanks, Amanda! We promise we'll stop typing in the minutes without permission.next month!) Looking back at the minutes for 2023, certain big changes and recurring themes became clear:

The first is prayer! Requests come to the Lead Team from a wide variety of sources and with different levels of confidentiality. The Lead Team is committed to prayer for the church in general and in specific ways, both inside and outside of meeting times. Prayer became such a large part of

the meetings, that we decided to set aside several meetings a year to focus on prayer. The first such meeting happened this past May. The first half of the Lead Team meeting would be held jointly with the Foundations Prayer Team. Together, the teams held up the needs of the church and the community. Eighteen people packed into Katie Madden's condo for a time of prayer, organized around the ACTS prayer format (Adoration, Confession, Thanksgiving, Supplication). Different members from LT and Foundations Prayer led through each section, with others joining in. It was awesome! The teams joined up again in September and prayed through the various ministries of the church. The Lead Team and Foundations Prayer plan to continue this practice of joint prayer meetings.

Secondly, this has been a year where the Lead Team has been asked to consider and pray over some weighty decisions. The church continues to look for an Associate Pastor of Discipleship since Jake Brooks became a full time chaplain with the Army. The Lead Team has had a big representation on the hiring team and has been joined by the elders and members of the church. As of the writing of this report, the hiring team seems close to finalizing a new hire.



Lastly, back in late 2022, a pair of churches approached Community Church about the idea of renting our space to hold their worship services. After much prayer and discussion, the Lead Team, along with the Elders, entered into an agreement with Revival Church for the Nations (RCN), a biblically-based, Portuguese-speaking church congregation. We have been sharing space with RCN since this past April. The churches have explored various opportunities to come together, including for the Easter Sunrise Service and the pancake breakfast that follows. It has been exciting to catch a glimpse of the ways that God might use our two churches' shared place and shared love of Him to His glory. We look forward to seeing where God will take us in the future.

Perhaps that's an appropriate takeaway from this year's Lead Team: anticipation. Whether in prayer for the needs of the congregation, for the ministries of the church, for the pastor of discipleship, or prayer for what God is going to do next in and through those who love him in any language here on Cape Ann--we get to anticipate that a God who has shown himself to be faithful will continue to reveal his grace, love, and provision.



2023 SERMON SERIES



Winter 2023 (February-April) - Twist Parables

During the winter months, we were studying the parables of Jesus: the surprising stories told by the Master Storyteller himself. These are stories about common, everyday things, but they also have a kick to them -- a twist -- where there's some aspect of the story that jumps out at the listener, saying, "Hang on, that's not the way the story is supposed to go." They invite us to wrestle with what they mean and raise questions in our own hearts about what it means to love and follow Jesus.



January 2023 - Lord, teach us to pray

We started this year's preaching sitting at the feet of Jesus, asking him the same question the disciples asked: "Lord, teach us to pray." We spent four weeks diving deep into the Lord's prayer and were reminded that our God is a good Heavenly Father who delights to meet with us in prayer, and delights to give His unshakable Kingdom to us as we seek it.



Spring 2023 (April-June) - Colossians

There's a line in the first chapter of Colossians, in Paul's opening prayer for the church in that city. He prays for wisdom and for a knowledge of God's will so that they may, "live a life worthy of the Lord and please Him in every way..." We spent the spring together in the book of Colossians looking at the kind of church that pleases God in every way, and seeking to take these deep biblical truths and live them out in our own day and time.




Summer 2023 (July-August) - Pointing to Jesus:a A Summer in the OT



I thought I was fast, but have you ever tried to race a group of kids from the sanctuary to the nursery? I lost. Until the kids realized they needed to slow down to actually find the characters, rather than just sprint from room to room. We found them all, shared the miraculous story of Jesus coming to the broken world, AND played more games together.

SUNDAY SCHOOL

Our committed teachers have spent time in Scripture with our preschool through fifth grade students, going deep into the history of the Israelite people. We've studied God's heart for his people and how his plan is greater than the brokenness of sin. The stories of David and his desperation to be in touch with God as he becomes king through the Psalms, and the wisdom of Solomon recorded in Proverbs, brought us into the summer. Throughout all of 2023, we studied the Kings of Israel and the prophets who guided them back to God, leading right up to the exile of Babylon. Our lessons will continue this winter of how God still had a plan for His people through exile. One of our favorite lessons of the year has been the story of Isaiah and the prophecy he spoke about the coming Messiah. A second grade student said, "I know who the Messiah is! That's Jesus" during our Sunday morning lesson about Isaiah. This is just one short

story about God's work in the hearts of our kids, and it's important to remember that we were once these kids too.

We took a brief hiatus this summer to invite our second graders and up into the service to learn from our preachers how God can move in our hearts and lives. They were able to go into each service with a sermon journal to take notes, draw, and to focus on the questions asked throughout the sermons. Two of our fourth grader parents said that their students listened more than they expected to the sermons and had questions for them at home!







What a year it has been. From snow camp at the start of the year, to the final minutes of our Christmas party - it has been a year of stepping into new places, and continuing to find the Lord faithful to meet us in all of them, doing what only He can do. There were many times this year that the Lord showed up in ways that only He could. It gets me fired up and excited to continue to serve and be part of what He is doing. I want to share just a few of these with you:

As you'll read in more detail later in this report, one of the ways we saw the Lord show up was around Burnham's summer field days. I honestly had no idea what to expect when we first showed up at Burnham's Field. Would people even come? The idea started with three of us around a kitchen table, a couple of basketballs and footballs, and the desire to provide a space to reach out to students and families in the heart of our city. That was it. As the idea grew we were presented with the opportunity to partner with The Open Door to provide meals and snacks for the students and families who might come. It seemed like a nobrainer and smooth sailing..until I was introduced to the world of FDA food safety protocols, and procedures, and training, and safe handling requirements, and unannounced Board of Health

site supervisions and evaluations that would be part of it! What started as just an idea to play pickup basketball downtown, now seemed like much more than I had capacity to process or physically do. After talking with The Open Door, and still only having a team of just a few of us, I remember one morning distinctly praying something along the lines of "Lord, I don't know how we are going to do this, we need more help." A few hours later, I got a knock on my office door, and Nikki Lewis walked in and said something along the lines of "I don't know much about it, but I feel like the Lord wants me to talk to you about those field days, I got this image of being on the sidelines serving water or something like that. So I came right over to ask how I can be a part of the team." The Lord answers prayer. The team grew considerably, and because of it, across the summer, we had the privilege of meeting and sharing the Gospel and the love of Jesus with families who we otherwise would not have been able to meet.

Across the spring and fall we saw more and more students inviting their friends, and those friends inviting friends, to come hang out at YouthCenter on Friday nights. Our first ever Cereal Night, annual Missing Leaders' Scavenger hunt downtown, and biggest ever Pumpkin Chuckin' events provided spaces for students to invite new friends and check out YouthCenter. From those bigger events we got to welcome many new students into the regular weekly Friday night hang outs! And here we find another awesome God story:

One new student who we first met at Pumpkin Chuckin' this year, came back to Friday night YouthCenter a few weeks later. At that Friday night, I remember personally feeling particularly weary and preoccupied with details that probably don't matter all that much in the long run. Then while we were sitting in a small group circle, this student



began asking questions out of the blue, about sin, brokenness, Jesus, and the Gospel. The student shared that they had never been to church before, never held a Bible and had never prayed, but they were beginning to understand how we are lost in darkness, but Jesus is the light that comes to rescue us. It was amazing! Other students began chiming in in response to the questions, sharing scriptures, and by the end of the night we got to share the gospel with this student, give them a Bible and pray with them. It was a small picture of a much needed reminder, that all of this is the Lord's. He's got this, and He is so good.

This past year also marked the second half of Olivia Washburn's youth ministry internship. During her time on staff with us, Olivia was in charge of all of the weekly happenings of Friday night YouthCenter. Everything from communications, preparing and teaching talks and games, to equipping the leader team. At the end of May, Olivia graduated from Gordon College and headed back up to her home state of Maine to serve individuals with physical disabilities. This fall we also bittersweetly said solong to Chachi (you probably know him as Steve) Zacchigna, who after serving as a Youth leader for the last six years, moved down to Connecticut to be closer to family. I am so thankful for both Olivia and Chachi, for their willingness to use their gifts and time for the Lord and the benefit of these students, and for the joy it was to serve alongside them both!

At the close of this year, I am continually thankful for the privilege it is to get to continually see the the Lord moving in students' lives; And I didn't even mention all the students who publicly proclaimed their faith in Christ through baptism this summer, served on a youth worship band for the first time this fall, and stepped up to serve and lead in Sunday School across the year when most needed! Our

students have a hunger for the Lord, and a desire to serve Him and His people. And I am continually in awe and humbled that I get to be a tiny part of helping them do that. I am in awe that this is my job. What a gift.

God is good, and I am wholeheartedly excited for whatever it is He has for YouthCenter in 2024.

My favorite part of intentionally choosing smaller gatherings is that it allowed everyone's story to be heard and everyone to be seen. We ended the summer with an impromptu

indoor picnic at the parsonage after our walk on the Boulevard was rained out. With blankets and camp chairs we had sweet conversations and played card games, simply enjoying each others' company on a dreary summer night.

October brought more rain as we headed north to Temple, NH for our annual retreat! But the rain didn't stop us from having a great time, even providing an opportunity to dance in it. Dana Olson guiding us to time with the Lord, Katie Castelluccio and Amada Matczynski leading us in worship, Deanne Leavitt orchestrating amazing meals. More than 20 women joined us. Being there with women I love, and who love me just the way I am, provided a level of soul rest I didn't know I needed.

Our year ended with Night of Thanks. This was a highlight of my year, not just as a member of the Women's Ministry but the year as a whole. The image of a mirror and the theme of "I am who you say I am, not who the lies are telling me I am" was strong on my heart as we planned Night of Thanks. Stepping 1,000 miles outside my comfort zone, I offered to be the speaker for the night. With an answered prayer for peace and Dana cheering me on (and proofing my write up for hypocrisy) I was able to share the message I so wanted to share. FOUNDATION PRAYER

BURNHAM'S FIELD DAYS

This year we saw an amazing need for youth connection in inner-city Gloucester once the school year was over and summer was upon us. We met the kids where they were at, in the center of Gloucester, where our biggest park, Burnham's Field, resides. The Wednesday Field Day was created, and volunteers showed up that first Wednesday not knowing what to expect. We brought a flag football kit, soccer balls, basketballs, wiffle ball kit, an inflatable gaga pit, crafts, and snacks. Fifteen kids came that first day once they saw the setup complete.

Each Wednesday we shared a theme/word of the day, that could easily be remembered by the kids, and a prayer to Jesus. This theme could then be applied once they left the field day and went back to their everyday lives. Themes like forgiveness, love, purpose, courage, endurance, kindness, and joy in the midst of hurt, were important for us to present to the children. A few weeks into the field day, The Open Door partnered with us and provided free lunches and snacks for every child. The popularity of the field day grew, until the final field day where we had reached 150 children, and a bounce house was donated by The Open Door, as well as pizza and ice cream for everyone. God presented an amazing opportunity for us to build the field day, and He most certainly brought the children to us.



COASTAL CLEANUP

The Coastal Cleanup event was rescheduled for October this year, due to a forecasted storm on its original weekend, which made it a bit colder. However, many people still showed up to clean the beaches. Teams gathered at the church on Saturday morning and listened to Tim as he welcomed and explained our responsibility as stewards of God's earth. The teams then went out to Niles, Stage Fort, Rocky Neck, and Brace Cove and recorded collection of 872 items, out of which 500 were cigarette butts alone. Together, they removed nearly 185 lbs of garbage from the beaches.



ACTION BACKPACKS

Our congregation has once again teamed up with the Orthodox Congregational Church of Lanesville and other churches on the Cape to collect various items to fill backpacks to be distributed by the Action homeless shelter and Amirah, Inc, who provides resources to women who have been victims of human trafficking. It is wonderful to see the commitment and generosity from everyone to support this ministry!

Leading the city in Christmas carols was extra special as we got to celebrate Christmas AND the 400th birthday of Gloucester with the biggest tree yet, right on the water at Solomon Jacobs Landing. The Lobster Trap Tree lighting continues to be a way to serve and celebrate with our city, but even more so, it is an awesome excuse to hang out with each other, and have a heck of a lot of fun together doing it!

BLOCK PARTY







There have been some major changes this year with Amirah. However, a constant is that the Amirah Partnership team continues to meet every few months for fellowship, fun and prayer. We are a family united in a desire to care for these women, and our time together is special.

The first half of the year the team continued with familiar home-based opportunities. Members of the Amirah Partnership Team were able to volunteer in the home and make connections with both Amirah staff and guests. There were nights of fellowship and prayer in late winter and early spring at area churches that members from our team attended. Moving into the Easter season, Amirah was the church's Lenten Giving Partner, and the prayers and financial gifts from Community Church blessed the ongoing work and ministry of Amirah. This spring at the annual Amirah gala, team members volunteered to assist with set up, check in, and break down, while one of our own team members, David Nicastro, was presented with the Volunteer of the Year Award! The spring rounded out with a team favorite-Move for Amirah-a national campaign to raise funds for

the organization by getting outside and moving, running, walking, climbing, biking, kayaking, etc. It is around this time, mid-year, that the group found out that the safe house on the North Shore would be closing and this change from a centralized safe home model, would transition into an independent living model for Amirah clients, and this would change how we as a team support Amirah.

In the words of Amirah's Executive Director, Mary Speta:

"We are the only organization in New England offering this unique 2-year residential opportunity to women, and it is an important program, proven to be effective. We will be transitioning out of our safe home model, and we have partnered with PEHT (Partners to End Human Trafficking) to make this happen. PEHT is an organization in CT that operates a transitional safe home, and they will be taking over operations of our CT safe home while we focus our efforts on developing Rapid Re-Housing in New England. They are well-positioned to take over the operations of the CT home and continue to support women through that model. Rather than duplicating services, we are partnering to expand all options for sex trafficking survivors in New England.

As part of this strategic move, we will also transition out of our long-term safe home model in Massachusetts and concentrate our resources and our team on Rapid Re-Housing and our Community Resource Center, where we served more than 100 women last year. You may be wondering, what happens to our participants in our safe homes? We have invited them to come with us! They will be able to transition into our Rapid Re-Housing program over the coming months. You'll also continue to recognize our staff, as the team you have worked alongside in our MA home will be staying with us."



Since the North Shore home closed in late spring, volunteering efforts have completely focused on finding, storing, sorting, and delivering furniture to the apartments acquired in the rapid rehousing program. David Nicastro, Ashley Feleen, Brian Moore and others from Community Church have collected, organized storage space, and delivered furniture to the new sites.

As a Church, please pray for good, useable furniture to be donated to Amirah in order to present to the women so they can feel proud about owning it. We pray for the continued success of the Rapid Rehousing Program and that God continues to bring many more women out of the dark life of trafficking, exploitation and prostitution and into the light and arms of Jesus Christ so the real healing and transformation can begin.



2023 ADMIN REPORT

God has provided a team of people to serve the ministries of Community Church behind the scenes and in a way that provides process and order and allows Community Church to fulfill its obligations as a non-profit in the Commonwealth of Massachusetts and under the rules of the IRS.

As we close 2023 we want to thank Bill Woodson for his many years of service as the church bookkeeper. He has been faithful in paying bills on time, balancing bank statements, and helping to provide the appropriate separation of duties throughout. He is working with Pamela Curtis and Deborah Michel as they have stepped up to take on this role moving forward. We are thrilled to welcome them to the Admin Team.

As you can see from the financial reports, God continues to bless Community Church through the generosity and faithful giving of each of you as members and part of our congregation. As outlined at the December Budget meeting, with the addition of the RCN rental income, we are completing this year with a surplus. In an effort to conservatively plan for the future and not depend on 100% of the rental income, the Lead Team has decided to only include \$20,000 of the rental income in the 2024 budget. This increase will help cover the additional expenses related to the rental and allow us to reserve a balance that can be used to bridge the gap should the situation change in future years.

Another area of oversight for the Admin Team is the use and care of the facility. We are blessed to have a church and parsonage facility that is unencumbered, allowing us to maximize our investment in our people. Russ Webber heads up our Facility Improvement Team (FIT). Coordinating contractor work, organizing workdays and volunteer workers, and performing many projects himself, Russ spends a good part of his day off on

Mondays at the church making sure we take care of this important asset properly for His service. We also want to thank Nikki Lewis, who serves as our sexton, cleaning the church each week in preparation for worship, youth center, small groups meetings and so much more.

This year, under Russ's leadership and direction, the following projects were completed:

Church Building

- Purchased and mounted projectors to the ceiling in the sanctuary
- Installed permanent wiring for the sound system
- Upgraded electrical wiring for the stage area
- Annual inspection and maintenance of the basement pump system
- Replaced the fellowship hall dehumidifier under warranty
- New larger [7'x10'] YouthCenter shed was purchased and built by the church family
- Tree in the back corner if the church property was removed, in coordination with our neighbor's request
- Lighting upgrades to second floor office for RCN's pastor
- Annual Fire Detection and Alarm System Inspection
- Annual Fire Extinguisher Inspection
- Annual Kitchen Stove Ansul System Inspection

Parsonage

- Patched and painted interior walls and ceilings on first and second floor rooms, hallways and stairways
- Upgraded numerous ceiling lights with LED fixtures
- Repairs to leaking roof, found when patching and painting was being done
- Dishwasher replaced
- Garbage disposal replaced



The 2024 budget is a reflection of the mission and priorities of Community Church. Our greatest investment is in people, with almost 65% of our budget as compensation and benefits. We invest in each area of our mission to Exalt, Equip, Extend and see an Enjoyment of God's presence in all the ministries of Community Church. We also endeavor to give 10% of our resources through outreach and support.



Our Mission

We understand that the "mission" of the church — every church — comes from God as he has revealed it in the Bible. Accordingly, the mission of our church is aligned directly to this unchanging and universal call to churches everywhere. Community Church exists:

to EXALT God, to EQUIP His people, to EXTEND His grace into the world and to ENJOY His presence.

These "four E's" define us and guide us as we invest our time, energy and resources into life together as a church. Our mission should never change, because it is a statement of purpose that has been revealed in Scripture. Even as we discuss vision below, it is important to see that who we are, and our overall purpose as a church is not changing at all.

Our Current Vision

In this season, we believe we are being called to recognize that we are a part of the larger city of Gloucester and the many other cities represented as we worship together on Sunday mornings — cities into which God has intentionally placed us. Our current vision is:

Making disciples for the glory of Christ and the good of the city.

We are being called outward into the city to love and serve our neighbors in tangible and concrete ways precisely because of the God's love for us in Christ Jesus. We are being called to work for the good of the city.

Yet, even as we head outward into the city, we will not settle for mere voluntarism or activism; we are focused on the glory of Jesus, and understand our calling to share the good news about Jesus in clear, relevant and meaningful ways. We want to celebrate Jesus and bring Him glory. So we work for the glory of Christ.

Bringing these two ideas together, we also recognize that the highest good for our cities is for our neighbors, coworkers, family members and friends to have the opportunity to meet Jesus and to respond to His saving grace, which brings Him great glory. In this way, we work for the glory of Christ and the good of the city.

To accomplish all of this, as a church we need to be making disciples — people who are following Jesus with their whole lives as we participate in our neighborhoods, as we serve in our cities, and as we love and serve those around us. So we invest in equipping the church for worship, for growth, and for sharing the love of Christ in tangible ways by making disciples and learning together how to follow Jesus more and more in all areas of our lives.



Our Distinctives

As Christians, we share a common set of beliefs with millions of believers throughout history and around the world. We also recognize that we have certain distinctives, or core values, that help us maintain our identity and carry out our mission and vision together. Our distinctives are:

Grace | Equipping | Participation | Collaboration | Sending

Grace

We believe grace should govern all relationships. Therefore, we extend grace to one another for the sake of unity, growth, and witness; and we extend grace to unbelievers with the hope that they may experience redeeming grace.

Equipping

We believe it is the duty of the church to make disciples by training Christians for life and ministry. Therefore, we desire to help every believer to identify their gifts, to develop their abilities, and to equip them for effectiveness in ministry.

Participation

We believe that every Christian is called to ministry and uniquely gifted to build up the church and engage the world. Therefore, we invite every believer to cultivate a lifestyle of ministry and provide opportunities for participation in ministry.

Collaboration

We believe that ministry and church leadership should be a group effort. Therefore, we embrace collaboration at every level of ministry and leadership to ensure that multiple perspectives are creatively brought to bear on our ideas, decisions, and ministries.

Sending

We believe that all Christians are sent into the world to serve the spiritual and practical needs of their neighbors for the sake of the gospel. Therefore, we communicate the gospel in relevant ways to people in our community and partner with those who are active in taking the gospel to the ends of the earth.



As a church we accept these areas of doctrinal teaching on which, historically, there has been general agreement among all true Christians. However, as a non-denominational church, we recognize that we are part of a larger body of Christians and denominations. We desire to allow for freedom of conviction on other doctrinal matters, provided that any interpretation is with integrity based upon the Bible alone, and that no such interpretation shall become an issue that hinders the ministry to which God has called us.

THE SCRIPTURES - We believe the Scriptures of the Old and New Testaments to be the inspired and only infallible and authoritative Word of God, and that it is the supreme and final authority in all matters on which it speaks. (2 Tim. 3:15,16; 1 Peter 2:2)

THE TRINITY - We believe there is one God, eternally existing in three persons: God the Father, God the Son, and God the Holy Spirit (Duet. 6:4; Matt. 28:19; Mark 12:29; John 5:17-30)

Jesus - We believe in the deity of the Lord Jesus Christ and in His complete and perfect humanity. We believe in the virgin birth, in His sinless life and His miracles, in His vicarious and atoning death through His shed blood, in His bodily resurrection, in His ascension to the right hand of the Father, and in His personal, future return to Earth in power and glory to rule over the nations. (Isaiah 7:14; Acts 2:22; 1 Cor. 15:3,4; Acts 1:9-11)

Humanity - We believe that man and woman were created good and upright in the image of God, but that they voluntarily sinned by disobeying God and thereby were alienated from God, and incurred both physical and spiritual death. That historic fall brought all mankind under divine condemnation. Because of the fall, each person's nature is corrupted, and they are thus totally unable to please God. (Gen. 1:26,27; Rom. 5:12-19)

Salvation - We believe that regeneration and renewal by the Holy Spirit is absolutely essential to salvation, and His indwelling presence necessary for the living of a Godly Christian life; and that it is only by grace, through faith in Jesus Christ that people can be saved. The salvation of all who believe is wholly a work of God's free grace and is not the work, in whole or in part, of human works or goodness or religious ceremony. God imputes His righteousness to those who put their faith in Christ alone for their salvation, and thereby justified them in His sight. (Luke 24:37; Rom. 3:23; 10:13-15; Eph. 2:8-9; Titus 2:11; 3:5-7)

The Holy Spirit - We believe in the Holy Spirit as a person, separate and distinct from and co-equal in the triune Godhead with the Father and the Son. He is sent to dwell within the heart of each child of God, to comfort and to lead into all truth. (Luke 24:49; Acts 1:4,8; 2:4; 10:44-46; 15:8,9)

Jesus' Return - We believe in the victorious reign and future personal return of Jesus Christ, who will judge all people with justice and mercy, giving over the unrepentant to judgment and condemnation but receiving the redeemed into eternal life. (Matt. 25:26; Mark 9:34-38; Rev. 19:20; 20:11-15; 21:8)

The Church - We believe that Jesus Christ is the Head of the Church, His Body, which is composed of all people, living and dead, who have been joined to Him through saving faith. God admonishes His people to assemble together regularly for worship, for participation in ordinances, for edification through the Scriptures and for mutual encouragement. (Eph. 1:22,23; 2:22; Heb. 12:23)

Ordinances - We believe that Christians are to be baptized, and are to partake in the Lord's Supper on a regular basis. (Matt. 29:19; Acts 2:38; 1 Cor. 11:23-26; Matt. 26:20-29)
